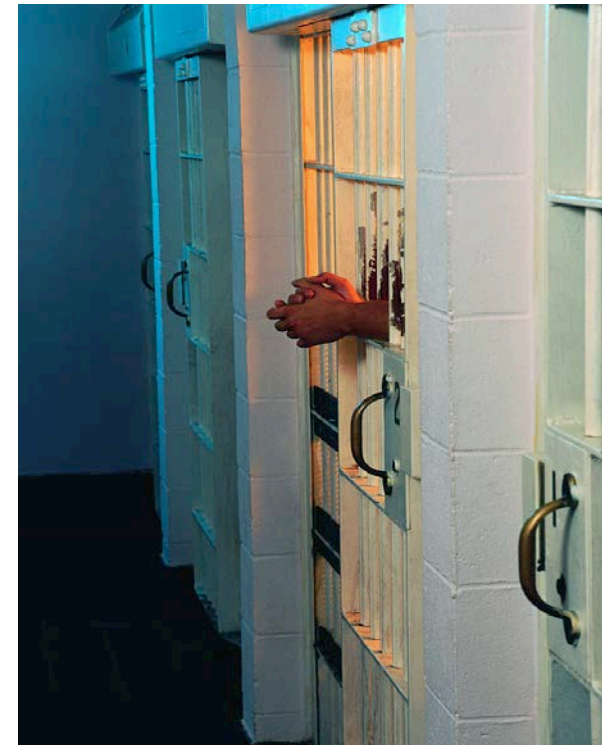

Corrections and Offenders Re-Entry

REQUIREMENTS

CORE III is a substance abuse treatment program that targets adult offenders re-entering Calhoun, and other surrounding counties. Participants must report substance abuse issues, and not necessarily have any substance abuse charges. To participate, the initial assessment **MUST** take place while the participant is **incarcerated** and within four months of release.

COREIII OFFER YOU...

CORE III will provide it participants with a pre-release substance abuse and mental health assessment work with corrections staff on individual planning to begin re-entry transition, substance abuse treatment, individual mental health counseling, and case management during and up to one year following treatment.



STATISTICS

According to National Re-Entry Resource Center.....

- Only 7 percent to 17 percent of prisoners who meet the criteria for alcohol/drug dependence or abuse receive treatment in jail or prison.
- Federal and state corrections facilities held over 1.6 million prisoners at the end of 2008 — one of every 198 U.S. residents.
- In 2002, 68 percent of jail inmates met the criteria for drug abuse or dependence.
- Half of all convicted jail inmates were under the influence of drugs or alcohol at the time of offense.
- Inmates who met substance dependence/abuse criteria were twice as likely as other inmates to have three or more prior probation or incarceration sentences.
